00:00:13.160 podcast uh we're here from the sandbox Center in downtown Barry today as a guest we have Lee Whitaker the owner of

00:00:24.560 welcome uh we're going to me Mike uh we're going to start with uh um maybe the history of your com I mean it's a

00:00:31.000 it's a milestone you're going to you're going to hit a milestone this year so where did the company come from and what does the company do yeah well thanks for

00:00:37.079 having me Mike first and foremost um the company started originally as you heard 40 years ago Founding Father Brian

00:00:43.879 started it immigrated from England and came over here as a draftsman and um that didn't pan out and started a small

00:00:51.079 uh business just fixing people's homes and renovating some things and in 1985 that's kind of where the doors opened where he saw an opportunity to sell some

00:00:57.160 trim and Berry and basically from there along the way it kept growing from the 80s into the 90s when the tornado went

00:01:03.559 through Barry it gave an opportunity for him to sell a lot of products direct to the home builder which continued to grow

00:01:09.320 and that continued to grow into the 2000s did he do a lot of the work himself when he started or did he always

00:01:15.280 a had a partner back then it was just him and a partner no install at that point just a lot of deliveries load up

00:01:20.759 the K car the family K car and hang it out the window and take it to sits and yeah we had one of those yeah I we all

00:01:27.079 did um two bench seats and a go-kart exactly yeah a family mobile car and

00:01:33.079 also a work car so that's just how things had started and it kept growing into the 2000s where myself I got

00:01:39.280 involved in early 2000s and continued to kind of um grow with the business and uh

00:01:44.719 and grow the business to Here we are now in 2025 okay so let's um I mean thing to jump into is let's see some of the work

00:01:50.880 that you've done and um uh like us like Acura glass products we're we're focused

00:01:56.280 on Barry we're focused on mccoa um we have trades people we do fabrication you guys do the same you guys have a a

00:02:02.360 fairly sizable fabrication shop right um visible from the highway yeah we have two shops so the first one the highway

00:02:08.160 is where we have our our showroom along with our office Bas for estimating and

00:02:13.680 purchasing Etc along with the manufacturing of our triond door Division and then we have another offshoot just across the street of about

00:02:19.680 another 15,000 square F feet of our stering railing shop where we produce everything okay great so a locally produced product um you know for and and

00:02:27.200 the higher end you you guys are capable of doing the higher end product that goes into the larger Cottages yeah correct anyway from Highway 7 up into

00:02:33.800 the mokas to per sound Huntsville Gravenhurst to Collingwood and and kind of Beyond okay so what the first picture

00:02:39.519 we'll start with is uh it looks like a ceiling um in a in a kitchen um maybe some some like beams that you guys are

00:02:46.599 fabricating and installing I'm going to guess yeah so what's trending a lot in the Housing Industry especially the custom menend as I'm sure you would know

00:02:52.319 is White Oak from White Oak floor to especially White Oak stairs and railing that we do a lot of uh with designers in

00:02:58.120 picking white oak doors you can kind of see a door in the Background by the kitchen uh which ties it way all to the way to the ceiling where you see some

00:03:03.959 full beams that we've built so we strap the ceiling with 2x4 2x6 whatever it might have been and then ripped the

00:03:09.680 pieces in the shop and installed them at site so would that be um would this look be specked by the designer or or I I

00:03:16.480 guess it would be there'd be many different versions of this where the homeowner saw a picture maybe even this

00:03:22.599 picture on your website they liked it and they talked to their designer or the designer came in saw something they

00:03:27.760 liked and you know advised the homeowner how does the process usually go to get some a look like this great question obviously pictures are worth a thousand

00:03:34.080 wordss as we know from websites social media and whatnot and also designers have a very fine eye on what they would

00:03:39.519 like to see in someone's home this one I believe was the homeowners that had seen a lot of pictures uh and and and surface

00:03:46.640 through stuff online and kind of came up with the idea it was really the idea was built as they were building the home they knew that they wanted a very open

00:03:53.640 living room from the kitchen all the way back to where this picture was taken by the fireplace and they wanted to kind of break it up uh on the ceiling with the

00:04:00.120 the beams to kind of accent the floor and the and the doors okay so this would have a lot of value to um to the

00:04:06.200 consumer to the homeowners and the cottage owners um to be able to bring in a picture or show you something on

00:04:11.439 Pinterest and say Barry trim can you make this happen yeah especially in our industry again the picture is worth a

00:04:17.199 thousand words we need to kind of see and feel or have an idea of what you're looking for uh okay so before we go too

00:04:22.759 far for those who are really short on time and patience what is your website exactly just in case somebody's listening they website it's pretty easy

00:04:34.720 perfect uh so we'll go to the next picture um which is a a popular look we we've see it we actually do this in

00:04:40.840 glass from time to time not SE those yeah not not as common uh the hardware to hold a piece of glass is uh somewhat

00:04:48.440 um expensive and complicated um but I've seen you know lots of trim you know trim

00:04:53.520 work or or doors or you know barn doors of different kind barn doors am I using the right term yeah there two barn doors

00:04:58.639 that were custom with basically a chevron pattern that you can see down the side of the doors which is pretty unique this is from their bedroom into

00:05:05.240 their masteron Suite so you can close it off or leave it wide open and it somewhat works as a form of art too when

00:05:10.800 the doors are open on the wall instead of having more paintings on the wall you can open it up and just you know see something that's that's pretty custom

00:05:16.600 these doors are obviously custom you don't just pick them off the shelf at Home Depot R Etc you have to come to a custom shop like ours BTM and showing

00:05:23.759 off to mil work correct yeah yeah and then you have it on two unique tracks instead of just having a single swing door into the bathroom at

00:05:30.199 it also gives you the space that where if you have a busy family people are coming and going into the bathroom as we all know at times you have uh you know

00:05:36.400 probably a four or five foot opening when these are wide open to get in there would it be fair to say that this look kind of came from you know a turn of the

00:05:43.240 century industrial look or or um they're called barn doors I mean i' I've I've

00:05:49.520 had a barn well a hanger an airplane hanger yeah where it had that kind of hardware and um unlike inside a house

00:05:56.600 out in a windstorm you're you're fighting the door cuz the door's coming off blowing all over the place but it's

00:06:01.639 very strong it can carry a lot of weight correct U it operates you know nice and easily especially if there's a guide do

00:06:07.120 you put guides on the bottom of this or sometimes they on guides uh obviously a space saer Also different than a pocket

00:06:12.360 door that would that would float in the wall a door swinging into the bathroom just sometimes takes up space so it

00:06:17.440 allows just to have an easier Breezeway and have more space in your bathroom too okay a long time ago a friend of mine had a cottage on Eagle Lake I don't know

00:06:23.479 if it's sir Sam's yeah and uh we went there we were teenagers um you know I went to the bathroom everybody was

00:06:29.720 drinking I went into the bathroom I used the bathroom facilities and then I went to leave and I went to push on the door

00:06:35.240 and the door wouldn't open and I pushed harder and I pushed harder until I could hear the trim starting to crack so I

00:06:42.039 said screw this I don't want to damage my buddy's Cottage so I actually jumped out the window about half a story down

00:06:48.120 landed in some bushes you know got birds in my and I came around the other side and I said to my friend mad I'm like man

00:06:54.240 you got to help me fix John's door I think I broke it and we walk up to the bathroom I it's jammed it won't open he

00:06:59.680 just sticks his finger in the finger pull and he it's a pocket door pull the backwards yeah so luckily I didn't push

00:07:06.000 so hard that I busted the frame well if you knew me then we'd be here to fix that for you Mike fair enough okay so

00:07:11.080 we'll go go to the next uh picture here sure um so this is a combination of uh

00:07:17.120 your product and our product that you sell through us um so describe what what do you see here so you obviously

00:07:24.479 well they have the standoffs on the level section and alongside of the uh I can't see the stairs on this one exactly

00:07:30.199 think we have to get to the next picture oh no next picture is different on the side of the Stringer I believe and also

00:07:35.800 just to kind of elaborate on the back you can also see the shiplap at the top of the stairs which is accent in that wall which is obviously very trending

00:07:40.919 right now out there um it might not be all over the house and some Cottages you'll see it all over but you definitely see it on accent walls as you

00:07:47.240 know Mike with glass it gives the clear open space open to below makes it feel bigger you know a larger scale sometimes

00:07:53.599 uh and um and very clean and modern looking so so let's focus in on the on the I'd like to focus on the glass we to

00:08:00.280 talk about glass all day I'm going to zoom in here um so we can see the shiplap so here's the shiplap that you were

00:08:06.360 talking about yeah um is that so I got some questions because I'm not familiar with it and some of the viewers might be

00:08:12.639 interested in this okay is shiplap done on top of drywall or in place of drywall generally I see it on top of drywall

00:08:19.039 depending on the scale or size of the job there's Cottages that that use the whole UPN North especially the M school

00:08:24.400 because they just use shiplap across everything and they would strap the ceilings and strap the walls and just put that on

00:08:30.360 uh I find Once the drywall's on you just get a cleaner finish keeps it just it just I I would think the drywall also

00:08:36.200 provides fire protection yeah it does it a little bit more sound barrier also sound barrier as well okay insulation I

00:08:41.440 guess not that it's insulation itself but a little more substance on the wall per se so I I've yet to meet a Canadian

00:08:47.800 where price is truly No Object most Canadians even the wealthiest Canadians

00:08:53.800 the the most wealthy Canadians are still price conscious oh very much yeah but if you're they're also safety conscious mhm

00:09:00.360 so I'm thinking that if you did that over drywall you you won't necessarily need type X fire rated drywall but is it

00:09:06.120 mostly over like quarter inch or half inch it's just normally just over a half inch drywall okay some people even with ship Lap making the decision you know

00:09:13.240 almost at the end of the job where it's all tap in sand it and they have been talking to the designer or the homeowner

00:09:18.440 or the Builder Etc just to say you know we need to kind of some more substance on the wall to you know have it some you

00:09:24.360 know to have a pop kind of thing so that's where shiplap has definitely been trending over the last 10 years okay so

00:09:29.920 I I would imagine that this is again an evolution in design you had

00:09:35.200 previously a lot of cottages would be instead of using drywall because they couldn't get drywall there would be Pine

00:09:40.800 board or pine ship you used to see a lot of V joint Pine on the ceilings and the walls and I think that was you as we got

00:09:47.560 into the 2000s was very much overbearing people looked at it and just were kind of pined out they started painting it to

00:09:53.480 or taking it out white washing it and whitewashing it and now they sell a lot of that stuff where uh you could get

00:09:59.480 finished Pine stuff also for the ceilings and do ship lops on the on all the walls which looks great um but very

00:10:06.000 much you know white clean modern look is what people are going for especially up North so what is it it's MDF hdf it's

00:10:12.880 MDF yeah MDF is a multii fiber board which is obviously just ground up sawdust into mold uh shiplap comes in 12

00:10:19.160 and 16 foot lengths so the 16s obviously are nice that you can run a longer span if it's on a ceiling without having butt

00:10:24.680 joints and stuff but 12's also work if you're doing an accent wall in a bedroom that might be only 10 10 x 10 per se

00:10:30.000 uh just to kind of accent it behind the behind the bed so are you installing it uh painted or primed or majority of the

00:10:36.040 time it's just primed was people like different colors our supplier does offer it and painted I feel that could be a

00:10:41.760 challenge at times because by the time you've put it on the truck and you ship it the site uh and you installed it and you cut it there's there's the amount of

00:10:48.000 touch-ups there are you're basically repainting it so it's generally just primed okay so so um typically you're

00:10:54.720 installing it primed then the painter will come along and they'll put a gloss or a mat or whatever the choice of the homeowner is y fill the holes paint it

00:11:01.720 and the way you go okay well for the for case in point I mean I do a lot of traveling in Moka in the summertime and

00:11:07.880 I've been into a lot of places where we're doing glasses you know staircases showers whatnot and this is definitely a

00:11:14.000 popular look um I would assume that if you put you know a good couple coats of paint on it there's a durability Factor

00:11:20.040 there too um and like you said the sound absorption as well if that's yeah aesthetic sound and I think it's just

00:11:25.560 more of the the visual uh from the eye that people like to see okay so we'll go to the next picture

00:11:31.600 here um this is a beautiful looking staircase I I assume that you guys built that and it's a um it's labeled number

00:11:40.040 five yep and it's a mono string or no it's two stringers open rise open rise I

00:11:46.480 think it's about an inch and 3/4 2 inch tread on it with a top mounted uh weo can rail on it uh to the Second Story

00:11:53.760 with uh the glass and the stand on it with obviously the lights mounted up the wall so at night it uh shines and just

00:12:00.240 obviously from a safety standpoint too but uh it's more of a unique spot that you can just get up without having all the lights on this is a beautiful one

00:12:06.240 that we did up in the Callingwood area uh with a custom home builder up there and uh pretty much just again just a

00:12:12.079 white oak stair that accents uh that matches the floor and um I'm not sure if there's other accents of white o in this

00:12:18.320 house but just a beautiful set of stairs have you ever did did acurate glass do the glass on this I believe you guys did

00:12:24.120 yes yeah um so just so so you know I can I can speak to the glass side of things I mean what we usually arrive at I

00:12:30.399 assume that the electrical fixtures were not there no yeah the electrician would come after and put that in like a div

00:12:36.160 well when we're working with some of these you you have to at times when you're measuring an early stage before drywall is really plot this out working

00:12:43.000 with the electrician to kind of have an idea of where the stairs are going to start where they're going to land and and how that electrical is going to line

00:12:49.360 up obviously you don't want it off centered off a tread you'd like to have it all going up you know parallel with it at the same time so it does

00:12:56.480 definitely take some coordinating alongside electrical or St layout and also the Builder to make sure we're on

00:13:01.680 line lots of coordination involved get a lot of prep work before you even you you go to build well it looks beautiful um

00:13:09.480 you know you look at the whole picture and and it's uh what What's that black material on the top is that you guys too

00:13:14.600 putting some kind of board on the wall you know what I was just trying to zoom in on that I'm not like I haven't been to this house directly Mike I'm not

00:13:20.040 quite sure what that is okay it seems to me that uh um at some point like if this

00:13:25.600 was my place and I was looking at it I would I would do something about that old school School register on

00:13:31.079 of yeah I do see that we can edit that one out that came out of a subdivision home in the 80s or would you think of a

00:13:37.600 set of stairs like this too and the way I like to sell stairs or glass or anything like that it's one of the biggest piece of furniture in a home

00:13:43.880 when you walk in generally a stairs of a house like this a custom one as you would know doing a lot of glass it's not hidden at the side of a home generally

00:13:50.480 unless it's an offshoot going to the basement or upstairs it's it's standing there staring at you right from the

00:13:55.519 front foyer so it's a it's a beautiful piece of furniture out of solid wood obviously that gives it that warp and

00:14:02.600 that homey feel so if somebody was um from a a practical standpoint wanted to

00:14:07.639 put a runner down the center of a set of stairs like this they would need to do each each stair individually when it's an open rise like that You' be wrapping

00:14:14.079 the stair generally yes uh I have seen it before people it's still like the

00:14:19.560 warmth sometimes of carpet or from um a safety standpoint if they feel that they were getting a little bit older wanted

00:14:25.199 to have a you know a handrail but also carpet to not be worried about slipping on that where you'd see some carpet Runners but yeah they might be you know

00:14:32.000 wearing the I I know for a time period I'm not going to get into how but I I I busted my leg okay um badly and and I

00:14:40.199 had to wear a nylon um like a compression sock yeah and it's slippery yeah it's like skates in the house yeah

00:14:46.120 yeah so you definitely have to be careful uh the the carpet again gives some warmth some character to it I

00:14:51.560 wouldn't say we'd see as much of that right now people like the warmth and of wood that they want to see and really

00:14:58.199 draw what they've put in the rest of the house it all kind of ties together yeah so if some so do you guys don't wouldn't

00:15:04.360 do the carpet WAP you do you have somebody you recommend yeah be like yourself something I would recommend is Irvine carpet on Bayfield we've worked

00:15:10.759 with them and with them for the last 40 years excellent alongside of yourself for many years so it's nice to work with

00:15:17.360 local uh companies and berries so we can all Network and work yeah we've we've had I'd say a relationship with her Vine

00:15:52.800 this long for a reason okay well so so let's dive into that a little bit so why why use local trades um you know why is

00:16:40.120 official name of the company B it's Barry trim I rebranded years ago as BTM just was an easier way to not as we're a

00:16:46.880 stare end trim company originated from trim it just kind of elaborated into three letters basically is what I'd

00:16:52.959 like to say fairm fair enough your logo is great I mean I was at a Barry Colts game last week and you know you know

00:16:58.519 took my daughter and a bunch of her friends you can see BTM on the boards I think yeah I've done a local rig Port

00:17:03.639 that for probably about 20 years on the boards there uh before it was did HD I

00:17:09.000 started on one side of the board I kind of work my way around to the other to know eventually you know it took me time to get there that the the OHL we be

00:17:15.959 broadcast in HD and you'd be able to see the boards and good local hockey B trim and United Home Hardware which is

00:17:21.640 another friend of mine a local company we split a box there and and it's great great entertainment and we bring Builders and people from up North there

00:17:27.640 to enjoy the local well and and the the BTM logo it's it's bright as clear it's red you know anybody's watching should

00:17:34.240 be looking for it I see it on signs I see it um you know your card floating around uh you know posted to boards this

00:20:44.760 can work on that scope we have a fully functional showroom about 30,000 foot showroom that you can come in that obviously we just worked on with

00:20:50.600 yourself and renovated all our stair displays and putting new glass and standoffs and spigots and stuff so people can kind of see uh what is really

00:20:58.120 trending out out there in the market and once they pick their scope either in the showroom or online on our website as I said before at trip w. bra.com you can

00:21:05.799 then get it an understanding of what scope you want estimating would work on that for you send it back to and that's

00:21:11.120 really what kind of just gets the ball rolling with the builder or the homeowner or whoever's who ever's building or renovation okay so we'll go

00:21:24.279 six that's a Bayo it's I might note that in this particular picture sure it's not complete um from a from a glass

00:21:48.840 Modern colors which obviously you know mic is black the door obviously on this one it pops with a red which kind of

00:21:54.080 unique um but yeah beautiful set of stairs yeah nice set of stairs and so

00:21:59.400 that's you know for anybody who's watching and looking at the selection that's Bay shoe um and of course uh it's

00:22:05.039 not the job's not finished it needs a caps on the end but um you know mostly that's cut at 45 the glass is you know

00:22:11.679 freestanding but supported on the bottom and it does give you the opportunity to actually see how that Hardware

00:22:18.120 works so so I'll zoom in here and you can see how there's it's an aluminum

00:22:23.400 there's an aluminum base the top of the glass is supported by Rubber um and then

00:22:31.000 uh there's caps the black caps create the finished product and of course a cap goes on the end mhm this is M again

00:22:37.360 compliments to you and your installers and Company just at the end of last year as we renovated the the stair displays

00:22:43.840 in our showroom you guys did a fantastic job and and helped us and it really allows people to come in obviously

00:22:49.120 pictures are worth a thousand words as I'd like to say but when you can actually feel this come in and touch it and see it uh from a stair perspective

00:22:55.240 it really allows you to figure out what you may or may not want in that build or that renovation well same goes the other

00:23:01.919 direction I appreciate it because um we find that people are not going to go to a showroom just to see glass glass is

00:23:07.279 see-through right yeah but they they're interested in the trim they want to see the the you know it's you know like tile

00:23:13.559 you know they're not going to select you know uh um from or sometimes people will select from a thumbnail on a computer or

00:23:19.240 whatever but uh they kind of want to come in they want to see the different options and of course in glass there

00:23:24.679 aren't there's options for Hardware there's um there are some for glass five or six of them but I'm going I guess in

00:23:30.960 trim like it's infinite well there's there's there's there could be hundreds yeah they want to come and touch and feel it or walk away with a sample which

00:31:46.480 frameless glass um so it seems what's happened there always was oil rub bronze
